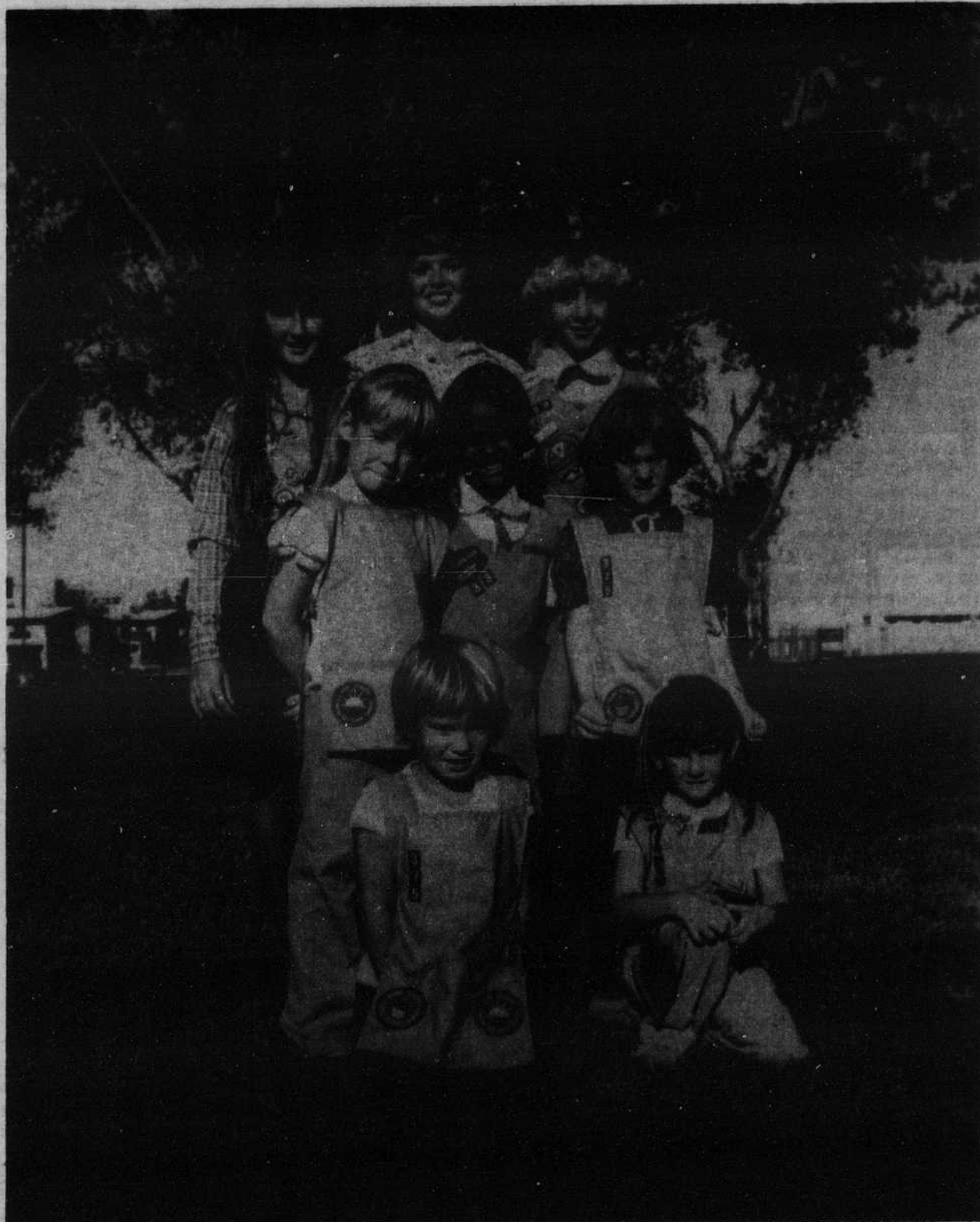

Frontier Girl Scout Council To Conduct Annual Fall Roundup



Frontier Girl Scout Council is presently conducting its annual fall roundup of new and returning members. One hundred Girl Scout Service Team adult volunteers, in twenty separate teams, are distributing Girl Scout information to all girls in the Council area of Southern Nevada and parts of California. They are also recruiting leaders, co-leaders, consultants and administrative volunteers to fill vacated and new positions. The adult volunteers are needed to support the more than 7500 girls expected to register during the 1982-1983 school year.

The Girl Scout program is open to all girls between the ages of four and a half and seventeen and the adults who subscribe to the Girl Scout Promise and Law. It is an informal learning program based upon girl interests and plan-

ning with adult volunteers who give leadership, guidance and support. The program is designed to inspire each girl to develop her own values and sense of worth as an individual, to enable girls from differing backgrounds to share their heritage; and to offer girls the joy of friendships and the fun of doing things that count.

Membership in Girl Scouting is \$3 per year. The age levels are Mini (4½ - 5), Brownie (6 - 8), Junior (9 - 11), Cadette and Senior (12 - 17) and Adult (women and men, 18 and over). The programs are based upon the skills and interests of the girls and carried out primarily in troops and groups of 14 or more girls. Older Girl Scouts (12 - 17) can join as individuals, troop or special interest group members.

Nucleus Plaza "Facelift" Project Underway

The owners of the Nucleus Plaza Shopping Center, which has remained stagnate and idle for the past 13 years, has officially announced renovation and remodeling plans for the 88,000 sq. ft. development.

John Edmond, President of Nucleus Associates, with his partners Steve Cook, Leonard Brown and Willie Shields by his side, made the announcement of the remodeling program last week. "It will be something the community will be proud of for years to come," Edmond said. He described the renovating, which commences next week, as Phase I of an 18-month renovation program for the center.

The remodeling efforts will increase both employment opportunities and will be an economic "shot in the arm" for the West Las Vegas area. Priorities for employment will be given the community residents, Edmond stated. Consolidated Construction Co. will handle the renovation program. Prospects as tenants for the shopping center once completed are franchises such as a Dairy Queen, McDonalds, Mayfair, and a light manufacturing company. Clark County

Youth Services has already acquired space in the center to house a youth services center as has a Metro Crime Prevention complex. The prospects of a bank branch and utility company offices are also quite good as being future occupants at the center.

In attendance at the news conference were a host of individuals including the press. Commissioner Woodrow Wilson, whom Edmond described as being "very instrumental" in helping acquire the center from First Western Savings were there. So were Ms. Mabel Hoggard who Edmond said encouraged both he and his partners to pursue their idea.

The company bought the center in January for \$975,000 with a \$200,000 down payment. Financial assistance was received from the Economic Development Administration.

Both Edmond and his Directors Steve Cook, vice-president, Leonard Brown, vice-president and Willie Shields, secretary-treasurer were all extremely proud of their efforts. Edmond praised everyone who made it all happen and gave their support in the efforts. He concluded the conference by saying, "Exciting things will continue to happen."
