

Chamber Announces Three Newly Formed Organizations

At the recent luncheon of the Nevada Black Chamber of Commerce it was announced by its president, Sarann Knight-Preddy that three affiliates which shall come under the direct jurisdiction of the organization have been formed.

"We are pleased to announce three new organizations which we're sure will be both an asset and will compliment the chamber tremendously," Preddy said. She then

introduced them as Junior Executive Chamber of Commerce, The Keyes, and the Women's Auxiliary Council.

The Junior Chamber, which shall be comprised of young and upcoming leaders shall, under the direct jurisdiction of the Board of Directors of the NBCC:

1) work closely with high schools to identify potential minority students desiring a career in business;

2) coordinate efforts

with Vo Tech, UNLV and CCCC to maintain a respectable percentage of minorities in their schools and work with those institutions in setting up work study programs for degree credits parallel to our need assessments; and

3) coordinate, develop and maintain scholarships to UNLV/CCCC for minorities who are interested in business, economics and other specialized disciplines.

The Keyes shall, under the direct jurisdiction of the Board of Directors of the NBCC:

1) be comprised of the twenty-five most prestigious and financially solvent individuals as designated by the NBCC's Board of Directors;

2) Once the KEYES have been selected, would have authority to elect their own officers and develop and promote their own programs which will financially support this chamber;

3) Will channel all funds for disbursement through the NBCC's Board of Directors through its general mode of operation, utilizing the NBCC's President along with the designee appointed/selected by the KEYES for signatories on checks.

Under the direct jurisdiction of the Board of Directors of NBCC, the Women's Auxiliary Council will operate:

1) to work closely with the fund-raising and membership committees to assist in raising funds for the chamber;

MONSTER JACKPOT READY TO PAY OFF AT CAESARS PALACE

The progressive jackpot slot machine carousel in the casino lobby of Caesars Palace in Las Vegas has the pulse of a ticking time bomb. The atmosphere of electric excitement draws the eye of every passerby who moves in and around the action.

The constantly accelerating light board sign that flashes the amount of the payoff, increasing in dollars by the micro-second, logs the winning amount at \$1,001,000 — and rising!

Ms. Preddy also disclosed that the chamber will be publishing a monthly newsletter starting in December. She also hinted that efforts were underway to perhaps open a branch office of the Nevada Black Chamber in Reno

The lines of people to play the machines in the progressive carousel are enormous, so much so Caesars has had to distribute numbered cards so that no one can jump the line and get in front of a player. Number-holders are allowed to move off the line and wander about, so card holders can return to the line. It is a frenetic sequence but nonetheless, considering the stakes, quite orderly.

Tension, as can be expected, runs high. The hotel has a nurse with appropriate equipment close to the carousel's perimeter in the event the jackpot is hit and someone passes out. Caesars is

taking no chances with the reaction of a player who will win the largest slot payoff in the history of the state of Nevada. In addition, the already voluminous Caesars Palace security force has been enlarged and teams of officers have the carousel area constantly in their sight-line.

The reactions of players waiting on line to take their shot at the Caesars Palace vault ranges from introspective self-absorption to giddy, nervous laughter. The huge payoff is a rainbow, a first-class ticket to a life of luxury, and everybody wants in on the possibility.
